Sponsorship

The Role Of A Sponsor

- 1. A sponsor can be there to discuss issues in detail that are too personal or would take too much time in a meeting.
- 2. A sponsor is there to model Christ's grace and forgiveness, and to give a sense of perspective.
- 3. A sponsor is available in times of crisis or potential relapse.
- 4. A sponsor serves as a sounding board by providing an objective point of view.
- 5. A sponsor is there to encourage an individual to work the principles at their own speed.
- 6. A sponsor attempts to model the lifestyle that results from working the eight principles.

Qualities Of A Sponsor

- 1. Lives the eight principles.
- 2. Exhibits a growing relationship with Jesus Christ.
- 3. Expresses a desire to help others on the road to recovery.
- 4. Shows compassion, care, and hope, but not pity.
- 5. Shows a willingness to listen.
- 6. Strong enough to confront denial or procrastination.
- 7. Willing to offer suggestions.
- 8. Open in sharing their own current struggles.

Helpful Suggestions For A Sponsor

Before agreeing to sponsor someone, meet with them and discuss some of the following things with them. This should help both parties be clear before entering this relationship.

- 1. A sponsor can resign or be fired. This is not a lifelong commitment.
- 2. Agree on the length of time for the sponsorship. Will it be for the 4th and 5th step only or for more than that?
- 3. Discuss expectations before agreeing to be a sponsor. What do they want from you? What do you expect them to do?
- 4. Agree with each other on how you will interact. Will you call them? Will they call you? How much time do they want? How much time can you give?
- 5. Set specific times to get together and evaluate how the relationship is working.
- 6. Agree on how the relationship can be ended. Discuss this ahead of time so no one feels rejected or uncomfortable if this happens.
